## Welcome to our Holiday Gift Guide!


We have gathered here a bunch of books, old and new, that we think would make great gifts during this holiday season - whether for yourself (why ever not?) or for other readers in your life.




## LORENZO SEARCHES FOR THE MEANING OF LIFE, BY UPAMANYU CHATTERJEE

After a decade in a monastery near Padua, he moves across the world to a monastery in Bangladesh. And finds that a life of service to God is enough, but that it is also not enough. Winner of the 2024 JCB Prize for Literature.




## MINOR DISTURBANCES AT GRAND LIFE APARTMENTS, BY HEMA SUKUMAR


#### PANKAJA, BY VASANTH KANNABIRAN


#### TEEN COUPLE HAVE FUN OUTDOORS, BY ARAVIND JAYAN

#### ROSARITA, BY ANITA DESAI



#### KANTHAPURA, BY RAJA RAO

A landmark Indian novel that captures the spirit of the Gandhian movement for independence. Through the voice of an elderly village woman, it tells the story of a small South Indian village that rises up against British rule.


#### KHWABNAMA, BY AKHTARUZZAMAN ELIAS (TR. ARUNAVA SINHA)

A sweeping saga set in pre-partition Bengal that documents the Tebhaga movement, when peasants demanded two-thirds of the harvest they produced on the zamindars' land. Through interwoven stories and magical realism, we explore the lives of villagers grappling with poverty, exploitation, and the looming shadow of political upheaval.




#### FIRST FLOOD (PONNIYIN SELVAN 1), BY KALKI (TR. GOWRI RAMNARAYAN)

Delving into politics, betrayal, desire and ambition in tenth-century Tamil Nadu, Ponniyin Selvan is Kalki's magnum opus, a gripping tale that has remained popular and beloved for decades. Translated by Gowri Ramnarayan, Kalki's granddaughter, First Flood is Book 1 in a series of four books.




#### YASHODHARA, BY VOLGA (TR. F S V PRASAD)


#### HA HA HU HU, BY VISWANADHA SATYANARAYANA




#### FOLKTALES FROM INDIA, ED. A.K RAMANUJAN




#### SOURDOUGH, BY ROBIN SLOAN


#### **ENLIGHTENMENT, BY SARAH PERRY**


## MRS. PALFREY AT THE CLAREMONT, BY ELIZABETH TAYLOR




#### YOU ARE HERE, BY DAVID NICHOLLS




## MENDELSSOHN IS ON THE ROOF, BY JIRI WEIL


## GLORIOUS EXPLOITS, BY FERDIA LENNON


#### **ODYSSEY, BY STEPHEN FRY**


#### HITS & MISSES, BY SIMON RICH




## WHEN WE CEASE TO UNDERSTAND THE WORLD, BY BENJAMIN LABATUT




## THE KELLERBY CODE, BY JONNY SWEET


## THE LITTLE SPARROW MURDERS, BY SEISHI YOKOMIZO


## DEATH AT THE SIGN OF THE ROOK, BY KATE ATKINSON

## MADE FOR MURDERS, BY PETER TREMAYNE



## MURDER AT THE MUSHAIRA, BY RAZA MIR




#### THE ADVENTURES OF AMINA AL-SIRAFI, BY SHANNON CHAKRABORTY


#### SET MY HEART TO FIVE, BY SIMON STEPHENSON




## THE LAST HERO, BY TERRY PRATCHETT




## THE MINISTRY OF TIME, BY KALIANE BRADLEY
